Economic Development Farmer Lenard, the Optimist



Lenard Esendi Mayodi is an optimist. Like all farmers, he has to be. This year, however, Lenard has reason to be upbeat. In early March he planted one acre of his small farm with seeds provided by P4P. Two months later when our P4P team visited him early in May, the crop was beginning to flower—a little later, he said, than seed he's used in the past.



But he's encouraged because what

he sees so far is healthy. That's as it should be, because the P4P seed is more resistant to pests, especially a kind of worm found in Africa that can devastate crops.



"I'm confident the seed is good," said Lenard. He's hoping for the same kind of high yields that other farmers in P4P's economic development program have experienced. Previously, Lenard reports that he harvested four to five bags of maize per acre. If the experience of the other P4P participants is anything to go by, he is looking for a double digit yield this year, or two harvests a year, weather permitting. Even the special mix of seeds and two kinds of fertilizer can't guarantee results, however, as some of the farmers found last year when the rains were poor.

If all goes well though, Lenard is looking forward to handing over one bag of

maize per harvest to P4P as a payback, and that contribution will go toward supporting our scholarship program.




Over the years, board meetings have moved from Stacey's dining room to various sites
