

The Medical Dream Team Arrived Safely in Kenya


September trip organizer Beth Sheeran reports that this month's Kenya team includes herself, Fleur Coulter, a midwife with Community Health Association (CHAS), Lindsey Morris, a medical assistant who also works for CHAS and April Lalis, a registered nurse at Holy Family.

The team will train clinicians on management of post-partum hemorrhage. They will meet with Community Health Volunteers to discuss how to monitor women during pregnancy and after birth. They will problem-solve with mothers in the Power of Milk Program who are dealing with babies that struggle to breast feed. The team



will be learning how to navigate cultural issues surrounding family planning and women's health care.

The focus of P4P's medical trips has shifted from providing medical care to hundreds of people to mutual teaching and learning, creating an exchange between clinicians and team members. By sharing and learning from clinicians, we believe lasting relationships will be formed and more sustainable changes will be brought to the community.



Meet Board Member Geoffrey Mwangi

A chance meeting with a doctor in Oregon opened the door for Dr. Geoffrey Mwangi, DNP, to become involved with Partnering for Progress. While studying for his doctorate degree in nursing in Oregon, Geoffrey met Teresa Gibson. When he told her he was moving to Spokane to work as a Doctor of Nursing Practice at the Native Project Clinic, she suggested he contact Stacey Mainer at P4P.

Geoffrey was invited to join the Board of Directors and he also serves as an advisor to the board and committees regarding Kenyan culture.

Geoffrey grew up near the town of Ol Ka'lou in Kenya's Central Province. He came to the United States in 2002 to attend the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay. Geoffrey returns to Kenya about every two years to visit family and do medical volunteer work.

"I like the fact that P4P is committed to the people of western Kenya -- raising their standard of living, improving their health, providing water and basic sanitation," Geoffrey says. "In addition, P4P invests in the education of young leaders for tomorrow. That is very respectable."

His wife, Courtney, a part time audiologist, also volunteers with P4P and is currently helping with our Into Africa Auction.

"I have a two-year-old son, Judah, who definitely keeps me on my toes! My family enjoys traveling, seeing new places and having adventures. We like camping and hiking. I like to play soccer and run and spend time with my family."


